COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will introduce students to social and cultural anthropology. Drawing from case studies in the course text and from other sources, we will explore the fundamental issues and approaches within social and cultural anthropology. Topics of interest include the structure and function of society, and essential institutions (e.g., marriage, religion, economy, politics, and gender) within societies. Emphasis will be placed on both the diversity of human culture and the commonalities that are found across human cultures. The course will largely follow a lecture format, though films will supplement lecture materials.

COURSE FORMAT

The format will consist of interactive lecture-discussions, accompanied by the occasional film or guest speaker. Lectures will not repeat or cover all the material in the text but will elaborate on selected topics to provide a deeper understanding of the material. Assigned textbook readings may be augmented with suggested additional readings.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/OUTCOMES

At the completion of the course, students should be able to:

- 1. Show a basic understanding of the concepts, theories, methods and central issues of cultural anthropology that will form the basis for future studies in social and cultural anthropology.
- 2. Demonstrate an appreciation of the social and cultural diversity resulting from the variety of ways people around the world have organized their lives and given meaning to their environment and their experiences;

- 3. Apply anthropological approaches, methods, and concepts to critically think about Western culture and society;
- 4. Understand and indicate the links between the individual, their social world(s), and global processes
