COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an overview of World archaeology, understood as the historical trajectory from human origins, the worldwide spread of Homo sapiens, the development of agriculture and domestication, and the emergence of social complexity in ancient urban societies, states, and empires.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

The Department of Anthropology and Archaeology is committed to student knowledge and skill development. Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Identify significant events and processes of the human past.
- Appreciate the diversity and complexity of archaeological research and its role in understanding the past.
- Understand the main debates on archaeological research questions about the deep past.
- Critically assess concepts used to interpret archaeological sites and processes.
- Recognize the relationship between material evidence and interpretation of archaeological sites.

READINGS AND TEXTBOOKS:

 There are no required textbooks. Links to required reading (articles and book chapters for each unit) will be provided on D2L. If you need any help understanding the material, please don't hesitate to contact me.

REQUIRED TECHNOLOGY and EQUIPMENT:

COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND ASSESSMENT

• Exam 1: 25% (Units 1 and 2) January 29

• Exam 2: 30% (Unit 3) February 26

• Exam 3: 30% (Unit 4) March 20

• Exam 4: 15% (Unit 5) April 8

All exams are in-person, not cumulative, and correspond to each of the 5 units (see above). Exams are <u>closed book</u>, and course notes are not permitted. Questions will be a mix of multiple choice and written short answer questions.

Exam Deferral Policy

Missed examinations cannot be made up without the approval of the instructor. Exams may only be deferred in the case of serious illness or medical emergency, religious observance, or domestic affliction (see: https://www.ucalgary.ca/registrar/exams/deferred-final-exams). Students who miss a exam have up to 48 hours to contact the instructor to ask for a makeup exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup exam. Makeup exams will differ significantly in form and content from the regularly scheduled exam. Once approved by the instructor, a makeup exam must be written within two weeks of the missed exam on a day/time scheduled by the instructor.

Documentation

Students may provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request to a deferred examination. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation. This could be medical certificate/documentation, references, police reports, invitation letter, or a statutory declaration, etc. The decision to provide supporting documentation that best suits the situation is at the discretion of the student. Students cannot be required to provide specific supporting documentation, such as a medical note. Falsification of any supporting documentation will be taken very seriously and may result in disciplinary action through the Academic Discipline regulations or the Student Non-Academic Misconduct policy.
