Course Description

Behaviours are temporally coordinated and occur in a rhythmic fashion. The most obvious rhythmic behaviour humans engage in is sleeping; we spend 1/3rd of our lives asleep. This course will survey the behavioural, physiological, neural and clinical aspects of sleep and rhythms.

Course Format

This is an in-person class held on campus.

Assessment Methods

1. Exams 60%

Final During exam period 30%

- Includes all material covered following the midterm exam (from March 2nd onward)
- Will be 2 hours in length

Exams will mostly be short answer format. Short answer questions will be graded such that part-marks will be given if it is clear that the student knows the general answer but have omitted specific details. Full marks will be given to those that include specific details and employ the correct terminology and concepts. Additionally, clear and effective answers will be focused and succinct. Answers that include extraneous or tangential information will not receive full marks.

Exams will emphasize lecture materials, but may also include limited material from assigned readings

The use of electronic devises, books and notes are not permitted during tests

2. Public Outreach Project 22%

Prepare an outline for your final paper.

- (2%)
- a. Should be no more than one page, and should include at least 4 references on a separate page.
- b. Submitted through D2L Dropbox by Tuesday February 6th
- Research and write a paper where you can explore one aspect of sleep or circadian rhythms.
 (can be the same area/question as your social media component).
 - a. This should be about 6-8 pages double spaced, excluding title page and references.
 - b. Submitted through D2L Dropbox by Tuesday March 19th.
- 3. Prepare a digital argument to be shared on social media to help educate the public about your selected topic. This can be a podcast, YouTube video, TikTok video or similar media. (10%)
 - a. You may work alone or in pairs.
 - b. Contributions should be about 3-5 minutes in duration, and can include multiple contributions (e.g., one longer YouTube video, or multiple shorter TikTok videos).
 - Email the link to your media to the course instructor by the end of day on Tuesday
 April 9th at 4pm

3. In Class Presentations 15%

Our 3 Presentations days will have 2 components each: a small written paper and an oral

presentation

Thought papers 3% each (9%)

<u>Presentations</u> 2% each (6%)

You will be assigned a topic at a week before the discussion day. In preparing for the discussion, you will be asked to prepare a thought paper about your topic (limit, one sheet of paper or 2 digital pages). See D2L for more detailed instructions.

4. Sleep Questionnaires Due on D2L Tuesday, January 30th

Students will be required to complete and submit three questionnaires on sleep and circadian habits. Data collected by the instructor from these instruments will only be used for educational purposes within the course and will not be retained afterwards. Completing these questionnaires will provide an experiential learning opportunity that will help students understand the sleep concepts discussed in class and relate them to their own experiences. Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.
