#### **Course Description**

A study of the nature of the Canadian film industry. Emphasis will be on the evolution of the Canadian motion picture industry in the twentieth century and how it is situated in contemporary popular culture. Other topics include Canada's historic relationship to Hollywood, the audience for Canadian films, the role of the state in funding, distribution and production systems, the impact of new technologies, and how the structure of Canada's film industry compares with those of other countries.

#### **Additional Information**

Attendance at both lectures and screenings are essential components of this course. Students must come to class prepared to discuss the films and required reading.

#### **Objectives of the Course**

This course has three main objectives:

- 1. To introduce historical and theoretical tools for considering the development and current status of the motion picture industry in Canada.
- 2. To analyze and critically evaluate the salience of these tools (and particularly the paradigms of nation/nationalism, culture industry, governmentality, and globalization) for a consideration of film aesthetics, film culture, and film in Canada.
- 3. To facilitate self-directed research into: historical or contemporary aspects of the film industry in Canada; a production history and/or textual analysis of particular film(s); and, the theoretical issues/implications raised by the Canadian film industry.

# **Textbooks and Readings**

Course readings will be available via the course website on D2L.

Most, but not all, of the films shown in the class are available for reviewing at the TFDL.

# **Assignments and Evaluation**

Class Participation (ongoing)

10%

In-class discussion is an essential component of the course. You must come to class prepared to discuss the readings and screenings. Class participation grades will be evaluated based on the quality of your contributions to in-class discussions.

# Five reading journal posts (ongoing)

10%

Brief but thoughtful and detailed reflections on an aspect of the upcoming week's reading assignment. Responses should be in polished, standard English (no point form or webslang please!), run a paragraph or two in length (approx. 250 words) and focus on a detail or raise a specific issue that you think is worth more attention. You are encouraged to respond (thoughtfully, respectfully) to your classmates' posts, and/or to post additional comments on the discussion board. These responses must be submitted on D2L by Sunday at 8:00 p.m. To get full marks, you must post five satisfactory (pass/fail) journal entries over the course of the semester.

# In-Class presentation (ongoing)

30%

Each student will present and lead class discussion on one of the weekly topics/assigned readings during the term; a sign-up sheet will be circulated in Week 1. In addition to providing a close reading of the article, the presenter should thoroughly research the week's topic and be able to present some of its scholarly and theoretical context. The use of specific media examples for analysis and illustration is encouraged but the presentation will be substantially oral. Presentation and discussion should be 15-20 minutes long.

Essay Proposal/Annotated Bibliography (Due in class March 30) 10% 3-4 pages, total, which includes a brief (300 words) description of your topic and argument, which outlines the shape your essay will take; AND a 2-3 page annotated bibliography that lists the primary and scholarly sources that you will use and provides a brief (2-3 sentence paragraph) explanation of the relevance of each.

#### Research Essay (Due April 20)

40%

An essay 8-10 pages in length. The paper may be on a topic chosen from a list provided by the instructor, or on a topic of your choice that has been approved by the instructor. Detailed instructions will be provided in Week 9. Students will give a brief presentation of their research topics on the last day of class.

#### **Plagiarism**

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
