Official Course Description

Introduction to physical landscapes and soils, emphasizing the formation and geographic distribution of mountains, volcanoes, valleys, and deserts, and their shaping by rivers and glaciers; and the fundamental concepts in soil science. Incorporates human modification of the Earth's surface.

Course Objectives

The primary objective of this course is to introduce and explain essential concepts of Earth surface and near-surface processes related to landforms and soils and their interactions with each other and the human environment.

Only pens/pencils and erasers are required for the tests and exam. No other materials or devices are allowed to be used. The midterm tests will take place during regular class time, in class, and will consist of a series of multiple choice questions. Each midterm test will focus on the material covered in lectures in that portion of the course, however, the concepts from each portion of the course build on the previous ones and as such there may be some synthesis style questions on the exams. Please also note that the activities completed in the lab sessions will explore concepts and topics mentioned in lecture in more detail, thus content and examples covered in the labs may also appear on the class midterms. The final exam will be two hours long and also will also consist of a series of multiple choice questions. The final exam will focus on the final portion of the course as well as cross cutting concepts from the entire course including lecture and lab content. It is not essential to pass all components to pass the course as whole. Lab exercises require a computer with internet connection and will including working with software like MS Word and Excel, Google Earth, etc. Computers in the lab (ES 307) are equipped with everything you will need to complete the lab exercises.

In this course, all missed midterm tests with valid excuses will be reweighted onto the course final exam. Missed lab exercises (with valid excuses) beyond the one replaced lab exercise grade described above, will be reweighted onto the final exam. In that case, the lab exercises used to calculate the average for the one replaced lab grade will exclude the excused missed exercise(s).
