Official Course Description

A broad introductory survey, from diverse perspectives, of the processes that shape cities and urban life.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be acquainted with a broad introduction to the interdisciplinary field of Urban Studies but with a specific emphasis on Urban Geography. They should be able to identify many of Urban Studies' key figures, especially in the 20th century, and their most significant academic contributions related to topics such as urban growth and development; social and spatial differentiation; urban cultures and societies; urban politics and governance; urban economic and political economic processes; urban design and planning; urban morphologies and infrastructures; urban pasts and futures. In particular, students will be able to comprehensively discuss the evolution of public and private spaces both in terms of the physical development of cities and how scholars have thought about this topic. Students will also refine and develop new intellectual skills to interpret articles, books, and visual media more circumspectly. Finally, students will able to suitably apply some of the ideas introduced in this course in structured fieldwork exercises focused on Calgary and in an analysis of a non-documentary film.

Course Format

- This will be a completely asynchronous course. Students may complete the lectures and the readings on their own times.
- There will be 10 multiple choice quizzes and 2 short papers.

Assessment Methods

- 1. 10 Multiple Choice Quizzes: Types of questions for these examinations will vary from multiple choice and matching to true/false. They will assess both factual recall, comprehension, and application.
- 2. Film Analysis: View a film with an urban theme and write an interpretation of it in light of the assigned readings and lectures. You will have a limited selection of films to choose from.
- 3. Calgary Exercise: This project involves applying this courses contents in an urban field report on an aspect of Calgary. The details of this assessment will be made available and it will be completely online.
- 4. There is no final examination in this course.
