REQUIRED READING. PARTICIPATION. AND SEMINAR COMPONENT (25%)

The seminar component of GLGY707, which is an essential aspect of the course, will focus on assigned readings, a written précis and a class discussion each week. The seminar component of 707 will occur in the two hour Wednesday class period. Comprehension of the assigned readings will be evaluated using a written component (précis) and by participation in class discussions.

A paper relevant to the topics covered in lecture will be assigned at the beginning of the seminar period each Wednesday and a précis summarising the paper will be due the following Monday at the beginning of class. Each précis will be no longer than 250 words and will conclude by asking three questions that stem from your understanding of the paper. The questions do not count toward the word count. Class discussion period will begin with a randomly chosen student or students providing a brief overview of the paper (not a reading of their précis!). Three questions, drawn from the student's précis, will then be presented by the TA for discussion by the class.

Rubrics will be used to evaluate the précis and participation in the class discussions. These rubrics will be presented in the first seminar period. The rationale is to be able to synthesize a lengthy work into a precis [**pré•cis** (prā sē´, prā' sē) *n.*, *pl.* **-cis** (-sēz´ -sēz) — 1. a concise summary].

The field trip will incorporate an exercise booklet. You will complete the exercises and participate in the trip by asking questions and engaging in discussion. Your grade for the trip will be determined using your field trip exercise booklet, as well as from your participation in the discussions. Make sure that you have a notebook, sharp pencil, hand lens, hammer, and pocket knife (to test hardness).

RESEARCH PAPER (30%) and PRESENTATION (20%)

The research paper should be less than 10 pages (typewritten, double-spaced, 12 point Times New Roman font) excluding figures and references, and a maximum of 15 pages including figures and references (references can be single spaced). Anything in excess of 15 total pages will not be evaluated. The research article will be the basis of your seminar presentation. The topic must be centred on some controversial or poorly understood aspect of the geology and geophysics of the Cordillera. The paper will explain the controversy and the current thinking regarding the topic, and explore directions for future research.

The deadline for approval of your article topic is Friday October 16, 2017. The deadline for submission of the paper (one hard copy and pdf) is Friday November 24, 2017.

Each seminar is to include 15 minutes of presentation and 5 minutes of discussion. Discussion of seminar materials by members of the class will make up part of the "participation" component of your grade. Seminars will be scheduled for the week of Nov. 27 – Dec. 1. Additional time on class days will likely be required.

FINAL ORAL EXAMINATION (25%)

Oral examinations will be conducted during the week of Dec. 4 - Dec. 8, 2017. Drs. Pattison and Gilbert and the TA will conduct the examination, but other faculty members may attend and ask questions. The examination period is 30 minutes per person.

ASSIGNMENT OF GRADES

Each component of the course will be given a mark out of 10. These will be combined, using the above weightings, to give a final course mark (converted to a value out of 100). Conversion of the course mark to a letter grade will be done using the scale below. The Instructors may shift the numerical cut-off levels down, but they will not be shifted up.
