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# **Course Description**

This is an introductory survey course in ethical theory. We will read selections from the history of Western thought in ethical (moral) theory, from the ancient Greeks to contemporary authors. We will examine traditional answers to the central questions of moral theory: What is the good? What is a good life? What does justice demand? We will also cover the major moral theories in the Western canon: Virtue Theory, the Divine Command/Natural Law, Sentimentalism, Kantianism, and Utilitarianism.

The first part of the course is an historical survey of moral theories, beginning with the Ancients and moving up to the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. In the latter part of the course, we will consider some contemporary ethical debates on abortion and animal rights.

- Broad knowledge of diverse philosophical issues, problems, traditions, and views;
- Ability to critically digest, interpret, and analyze complex sources;
- Ability to write a convincing argument that takes adequate account of alternative positions;

#### **Course Assessment**

There will be three sorts of assignments: papers, glossaries, and a mid-term exam. Writing and the grading thereof is a factor in the evaluation of your work for this course. There will NOT be a Registrar-scheduled final exam. Papers and Glossaries are due before 4pm on the date indicated below in the drop-box labeled for this course and located in the main hallway of the Philosophy Department (12<sup>th</sup> floor, Social Sciences Building).

# **Papers**

There will be two short (5-7) page papers due during the course of the semester. The papers will be on assigned topics from the readings.

The first paper will be due on Friday, October 20

The second paper will be due on Friday, December 8

#### Glossaries

Students will keep a glossary of new philosophical terms they learn in class, along with brief definitions to be written by the student themselves. **Glossaries must be turned in on the last Friday of every month.** 

## Mid-Term Exam

There will be a mid-term exam, consisting of both short answer and long answer questions. The mid-term exam will be held in class on Friday, November 3.

#### Mark Breakdown

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The participation grade will be based on participation in the tutorial sessions. Students will be evaluated on their contributions to tutorial discussions and demonstration of their familiarity with the reading material.
