Course Description

This is an upper level course in the philosophy of law, with a focus on intellectual property in the Canadian legal context. We will cover theoretical issues of the moral grounds for IP protections, as well as more technical issues in the application of IP protections in Canadian law. We will consider a variety of contemporary issues, including patents and copyrights in current bio-technologies, copyright and fair use in academic settings and the IP protections for novel things like RNA code, artificial life and other technological and scientific phenomena.

Required Text

There is no required textbook for the class – the readings will consist of a series of articles available online through the University's library site.

Assignments and Dates

The final grade will be determined on the basis of participation in class discussions, five short (1-2 page) summaries of the weekly readings and a term paper (12-15 pp), with a short (1-2 page) paper proposal due one month before. Writing and the grading thereof is a factor in the evaluation of your work for this course. There will NOT be a Registrar-scheduled final exam. The important course dates and assignment values are as follows:

5 short summaries, due before the end of term	40%
Paper proposal, due Thursday, November 5	10%
Final paper, due Tuesday, December 8	40%
Participation in class discussion	10%

Late Policy
