COURSE INFORMATION

One thing we can do with our words is ask what they mean. This is a popular activity among philosophers and linguists. Another thing we can do is ask what our words should mean. At least recently, this has been a somewhat less popular activity. More generally, we can ask what sorts of representational devices, including word and concepts, we should create and adopt in order suit various purposes. This is one understanding of conceptual engineering. We'll cover a variety of issues in philosophy of language pertaining to the possibility, understanding, and limits of conceptual engineering.

PREREQUISITE(S)

Two previous courses in Philosophy, one of which must be either **Philosophy 279** or **377**, and one of which must be at the 400 level, or higher.

- Knowledge of the key issues involving meaning endowment and change.
- Knowledge of the different models of conceptual engineering and their respective advantages and disadvantages.
- Ability to critically digest, interpret, and analyze contemporary articles in philosophy of language pertaining to conceptual engineering.
- Ability to develop and defend original positions.
- Ability to engage in constructive, respectful, oral and written argumentation

COURSE ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION

Assessment Components and Grading Schemes

- Four short papers (approx. 500 words), due on Jan. 23rd, Feb. 6th, Feb. 27th, and March. 19th, and submitted via D2L (5% of the grade each, 20% total)
- Two exams, in class on Feb. 13th and and take-home on Mar. 24th (20% of the grade each)

- One longer paper (approx. 4,000 words), final draft due on April 19th and submitted via D2L. Rough draft due on April 2nd and peer review due on April 9th. (1% for the rough draft, 1% for the peer review, and 23% for the final draft, for a total of 25% of the final grade).
- One presentation on the longer paper (a total of approximately 30 minutes, including time for questions). The presentations will be April 7th, 9th, and 14th. (15% of the final grade.) For those who do not wish to present, a written alternative can be negotiated with the instructor.
