	The course will pursue four distinct areas of inquiry throughout the term. Each session will include work in each of the four areas. Tempo movement 20 min The twenty movements 30 min Gradients 30 min Cartoon mime 30 min There will be two final presentations towards the end of term:		

- the 20 movement linkages
- the cartoon mime devised stories.

Tempo movement is a rhythmic approach to collective movement involving the entire group.

The twenty movements is a series of movement puzzles in the Lecoq tradition that must be learned exactly then arranged into a unique linkage by each student. The linkages will presented at the end of term.

Gradients includes a series a mimo-dynamic proposals from the Lecoq tradition that have their origin in observations of how the world moves, followed by a transposition of those observations into movement.

Cartoon mime is an irreverent approach to storytelling that invites the playful use of gesture to animate and illustrate devised work.

Assessment components

The final grade will be based on the cumulative result of a graded assessment made at the end of each class. The assessment will be based on an evaluation of

- participation 30%
- commitment and discipline 10%
- generosity 15%
- willingness 15%
- growth and development 15%
- quality 15%

Participation - attendance at all classes is essential, and non-negotiable. Failure to do so will impact the final grade.

Commitment and discipline - arriving to class prepared and on time is crucial to the work and will be evaluated accordingly.

Generosity - respecting and benefitting from the work of others is essential.

Willingness - students will be expected to present work or improvise in front of the group at each class, and must be ready to do so.

Growth and development - evidence of students gradually incorporating notes and instruction into their work.

Quality - the presence of innovation, energy, uniqueness, insight, and excellence in the student's work.
