Course schedule	Fall performance: An informal performance near the end of the term. Because of the COVID situation, the performance will be only with the instructor present. Students may wish to video record it, if all the ensemble members are in agreement. A letter of agreement must be signed by all the ensemble members, which should include an agreement on the type of distribution allowed, such as for archival purposes or for family members only, or for unlisted upload on a public platform such as Youtube.
