MUSI 402 03 is a multimedia survey course exploring the guitar and its history. The course will include an examination of the instrument's earliest predecessors from antiquity and the Middle Ages, through its first appearance in printed tablature collections of the Renaissance to its ubiquitous position today. Discussions will center on a survey of a wide range of music for the guitar and its various permutations and will include analyses and discussions of these works. Lectures will be supplemented with sound recordings, video, and live performances.
In addition to providing students with an in-depth look at one of today's most recognizable instruments, this course will assist students in developing a greater appreciation and understanding of the guitar's rich heritage and musical diversity. Lectures, class discussions, readings, and assignments will encourage the development of an appropriate musical vocabulary and provide a forum for intelligent discussion. Live performances on both modern and period instruments will provide students with a unique opportunity to experience often rarely encountered works firsthand. More importantly, a closer look at some of the guitar's most notable figures – Andres Segovia, Robert Johnson, Les Paul, Django Reinhardt, Chuck Berry, Jimi Hendrix, Eric Clapton, Toni lommi, Pat Metheny (too name only a few)- will help provide insights into the cultures from which they emerged.
