Course description and overview	MUSI 402.01 is a multimedia survey course exploring the music of Led Zeppelin, including an examination of the band's history from their pre-Zeppelin beginnings through their rise to superstardom. Discussions will center on an album-by-album survey of the band's music and will include detailed analyses of significant works.			
Course objectives and learning outcomes	In addition to providing students with an in-depth look at one of rock's most well- known musical icons, this course will assist students in developing a greater appreciation and understanding of the band's music and popular music in general. Structural analyses of select works will offer students a clear means of tracing and evaluating the development of the group's style. Lectures, class discussions, readings, and assignments will encourage the development of an appropriate musical vocabulary and provide a forum for intelligent discussion. By focusing on key issues surrounding the music of Led Zeppelin – the importance of the blues, the function of the acoustic set, the significance of non-western music, and the role of gender -
