#### **DESCRIPTION**

Targeted focus on further development of self-expression and communication skills through speaking and listening at an Intermediate level(JF standard A2 or U of C 2<sup>nd</sup> year level:JPNS301-303). Students who are in the advance level (JF standard B1-B2 or U of C 3<sup>rd</sup> year level:JPNS331-333) are advised to take JPNS441 Advanced Conversational Japanese instead.

[Prerequisites] Japanese 301

[Note] All university level prerequisites for Japanese language courses must be met with a grade of "C-" or higher.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

JPNS371 focuses on gaining self-expression and communication skills through speaking and listening activities by using the knowledge acquired prior to this course (in JPNS205, 207 and 301) and this course will help in bridging our 2<sup>nd</sup> year (JF Standard A2) level learners to the 3<sup>rd</sup> year (JF Standard B1) level. In this course, students will learn how to express themself and how to communicate effectively in a socially appropriate manner through a wide range of activities such as singing, reciting, performing, presenting, planning events, disucussing, games, Q&As and peer feedback.

#### **OUTCOMES**

After successfully completing Japanese 371, students will be able to...

- become more familier with speaking Japanese without having any fear and anxiety.
- become more familier with listening to Japanese and properly understand the information.
- gain practical ability communicating in everyday situations.
- express oneself in various forms such as performing, presenting, and discussing.
- bring their 2<sup>nd</sup> year level skills up to the 3<sup>rd</sup> year level in self-expression and communication, and enhance overall language proficiency.
- develop further cultural awareness to appropriately communicate in Japanese in different functions and situations.

## [General Course Information]

## [Participation]

- This course is in-person course and students must attend the lectures.
- "Participation" here includes regular attendance, active participation during the lecture, and preparation for the coming lectures including homework and daily practice. - During the lectures, students are expected to make voluntary remarks/responses and actively participate in the pair/group work.
- Participation (10%) will be evaluated by the instructor based on the instructor's observation during the class and student's self-reflection.

[Policy in case of missed or late for any graded coursework]

- When you are missing or can't complete any graded coursework such as tests and assignments in time with a legitimate reason, you must communicate with your course instructor <u>PRIOR to the</u> event or the deadline. Failing to do that will result in no make-up or extension (=a grade of 0).

## Tests

There will be 2 solo oral/speaking tests to evaluate your achievement on what you have learned from language activities provided based on the textbook. They will be scheduled during the class. More details will be provided later in the course. Make-ups and alternative date/time are NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

#### **Class Activities**

2 class activity tasks will be assigned to each group. You will work in group, complete the tasks, and present or share in class. More details will be provided later in the course. <u>Make-ups, extension and alternative date/time are NOT allowed</u>, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

# **Projects**

These 2 projects are take-home projects and you will present your final product in class. Project 1 is a live presentation. After the presentation, you must submit the video recording of your inclass live presentation via D2L by the deadline for evaluation. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will be accepted up to 7 days and subjected to a 50% deduction.

Project 2 is a video presentation. You will submit your video via D2L by the deadline fisrt, and then present the video in class. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason



including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. <u>Late submissions will be accepted for presentation video up to 5 days and subjected to a 10% deduction per every 24 hours.</u> For peer-feedback, late submissions will NOT be accepted.

## **Assignments**

## 1. Sugoroku making

You will design and make your own sugoroku and share in class. More details will be provided later in the course. <u>Make-ups, extension and alternative date/time are NOT allowed</u>, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth.

## 2. Obento challenge

You will design and make your own unique obento and create a video report about how it was. You will submit your video via D2L by the deadline. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will be accepted up to 5 days and subjected to a 10% deduction per every 24 hours. After the submission, you will be assigned to watch your peers' videos and submit your voting paper in class on the due date. late submissions will NOT be accepted for the voting paper.

## 3. Manga post recording

You will choose one manga page from the provided website, record the dialogue, and create a video. You will submit your video via D2L by the deadline. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will be accepted up to 5 days and subjected to a 10% deduction per every 24 hours. For peer-feedback, late submissions will NOT be accepted. You will also receive a grade of zero in peer-feedback when you are late for presentation sharing deadline.

### 4. Topic summary videos

You will be assigned to make a short summary video in Japanese that reflects on what you have learned from the textbook topic that day. You will submit your video via D2L by the deadline. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will be accepted up to 5 days and subjected to a 10% deduction per every 24 hours.

## 5. Self-reflection Log

You will be assigned to complete two self-reflection logs in this course and submit them via D2L by the deadline. The extension of the deadlines is NOT allowed, unless you have a legitimate reason including a serious accident, illness, and so forth. Late submissions will NOT be accepted.

# [Course expectations]

- It is required for you to complete all the listenings and Q&As in the textbook prior to each topic as homework.
- It is YOUR responsibility to check the class schedule and all the information on D2L frequently so as not to miss any upcoming coursework.
- It is YOUR responsibility to read well and follow the coursework instructions provided on D2L. Submissions without following instructions will result in a grade of zero or some deduction.
- It is YOUR responsibility to keep up with what you have missed during the class (including assignments) from your own absence.
- It is strongly encouraged to monitor your learning process in D2L. Self-reflection task will be assigned to improve student's learning experience.
- This is a fast-paced (6-week) course. On top of regular lecture time, you are required to spend at least 3 hours/week to complete all the assigned tasks. In addition, about 1 hour daily self-study is required to follow this course successfully. Further time commitment may be required to complete projects and assignments.
