DESCRIPTION

How do we make sense of words, phrases and sentences in language? How is it possible that the meaning of a sentence rarely equals the sum of the words included in it? Does natural language have formal logical components? What do we know about how language meaning might interact with other cognitive systems, or paralinguistic and extralinguistic aspects of our environment? This course introduces us to the study of meaning in natural language.

OBJECTIVES

We will explore theoretical issues and approaches regarding natural language semantics and cover the major extant theories of semantics including componential theory, formal semantics, and cognitive semantics. In addition, we will try to address the semantics/pragmatics interface. When possible, we will try to connect these with experimental evidence coming from the field of psycholinguistics including language acquisition and processing.

OUTCOMES

Students will acquire a good understanding of basic terminology and theoretical concepts and approaches in semantics. Through practice with appropriate problem sets and exercises, they will be able to apply this knowledge to basic questions about meaning in natural language.
