DESCRIPTION

An intermediate language and culture course that aims to boost language acquisition by consolidating and expanding the four language skills of listening, reading, speaking and writing. It includes a comprehensive review of the grammar studied at the beginners' level. Students will continue to explore cultural issues relevant to the Hispanic world.

The class is conducted in Spanish.

Prerequisites: Spanish 203 or consent of the Department.

Outcomes

In Span 301 you will develop both receptive (listening and reading) and productive (speaking and writing) skills as well as cultural awareness:

Listening: You will be able

- to understand the main points in the audio and video material of the Textbook and Workbook
- to participate in face-to face conversations which may require occasional repetition and rephrasing.

Reading: You will be able

- to understand the main ideas in authentic texts
- to apply an increasing number of reading strategies to derive additional meaning from texts so as to better understand the cultures and societies to which the texts refer.

Speaking: You will handle successfully a certain number of social situations. You will be able to:

- initiate and maintain face-to-face conversations on topics such as leisure-time activities, work-related activities, past events, personal feelings...
- express admiration, disapproval and surprise
- invite people to do certain activities; accept and refuse invitations
- ask and give permission
- express agreement and disagreement

Writing: You will be able to

- perform a number of practical writing tasks such as preparing lists, brief notes, and e-mails
- write structured texts of several paragraphs in length such as compositions, letters, brief biographies, and short stories.

Cultural awareness: Throughout the study and discussion of topics dealing with Hispanic cultures, you will expand your cultural awareness which in turn should increase your sensitivity to cultural differences.

COURSE WORK AND GRADING

Exams:

- There will be 3 exams (about 50 minutes each).
 - Exam 1 (Emphasis on chapters 1, 2 & 3): 20%
 - Exam 2 (Emphasis on chapters 4 & 5): 20%
 - Exam 3 (Emphasis on chapter 7): 10%
- Each exam may include questions on listening and reading comprehension, vocabulary, grammatical structures and culture as well as review questions from previous chapters.
- Check Blackboard for specific dates for exams.
- No books, notes, dictionaries or electronic devices (I Pods, cell phones, Blackberries, etc.) are allowed.

Compositions:

- You will write two compositions (10% each), of which at least one will be in class.
- The grade assigned will take into consideration:
 - Ideas and organization
 - Variety and correct use of grammatical structures and vocabulary (including the structures and vocabulary learned during the course)
 - Spelling, accents, punctuation and general presentation.

Written Activities

Besides the two compositions you will write a minimum of two mini-compositions in order to practice specific vocabulary and grammatical structures.

Activities from the eSAM:

All the activities from the Online Student Activities Manual from the chapters covered in the course are to be completed by a certain date as indicated on Blackboard. The activities are corrected and graded automatically by the computer.

Tutorials:

- The tutorial is an integral part of this course. Its goal is to allow students to actively participate in oral conversations and debates. To start these conversations you'll be asked to read and prepare certain texts and do some activities prior to the tutorial itself.
- Tutorials will start the week of September 19th.
- The mark for the tutorial includes attendance and active and positive contributions. The grade for this section will be granted as follows:
 - Student participates regularly and always comes to class well prepared: 5
 - Generally student participates and comes to class well prepared: 4
 - Student sometimes participates and comes to class prepared: 3
 - Student seldom participates or comes to class prepared: 2
 - Student never participates or comes to class prepared: 0%

Well prepared means that, before coming to the tutorial, the student has done the homework assigned by the instructor (which can include learning some vocabulary, reading and preparing specific texts, completing certain activities) so he/she can participate intelligently in class.

Oral Exam:

- It will take place at the instructor's office during the last two weeks of classes, outside regular class time.
- It will normally be done in pairs.
- It consists of a conversation with a classmate (you'll have 10 minutes to prepare this section) followed by questions from your instructor.
- Your performance will be assessed individually, and will take into account
 - fluency
 - grammatical accuracy
 - vocabulary range
 - phonological control
- Students are not allowed to read any prepared text during this exam.
- Failure to show up for the final oral exam will result in an F.

Late exams and Missed assignments

- 1. 5% of the grade will be deducted for each day a written assignment (activity or composition) is late if there is no written document to justify the absence or the failure to complete it. The Department's dropbox, located in the foyer area of the third floor in Craigie Hall between blocks D and C, is available for dropping off assignments and course work. The material placed in the drop-box will be collected and datestamped at the beginning and at the end of the working day.
- 2. A student who is absent from a test for legitimate reasons must discuss an alternative course of action with the instructor. The instructor may request a Physician/ Counselor statement form to confirm an absence for health reasons.
- 3. Do not make travel arrangements for the dates when in-class exams and compositions are scheduled. Missed tests, assignments and examinations with no legitimate reason will be given a grade of F.
- 4. Attendance for all exams is compulsory.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. Cheating at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such

as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.

DISABILITIES AND ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATION

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations.
