Course Description

This course is about the numerous ways that non-legal forms of regulation permeate modern society. This includes how companies regulate themselves, how citizens govern and regulate other citizens, and how we seek remedies outside of the formal structures of law. The course combines theoretical concepts with case studies and real examples from history, law, and sociology. We will focus on theories about self-regulation, moral regulation, governance and governmentality. Specific topics covered will include moral panics, protest movements, health and wellness campaigns, sexuality, corporations and unions, and the mafia.

Objectives of the Course

By the end of the course students should be able to theorize about how individuals and groups govern themselves and others and how these regulatory behaviours relate to the practices of self-discipline, self-government, and self-governance in a variety of legal and extra-legal contexts.

- 1.
