3. Grading:

Each piece of work (reports, assignments, quizzes, midterm exam(s) or final examination) submitted by the student will be assigned a grade. The student's grade for each component listed above will be combined with the indicated weights to produce an overall percentage for the course, which will be used to determine the course letter grade.

The conversion between a percentage grade and letter grade is as follows;

Each piece of work will be assigned a point score. All quizzes and Lab Skills questions are worth 10 points, Lab papers are 10 points, and the point score for midterm and finals varies. There will be 8 quizzes in total and two Lab Skills exams. Each lab Skills exam has two questions, each of which counts as a single quiz. Thus there are twelve possible guiz scores and only the 8 highest will be counted. The final course score is computed from

Course total=10*LP/20+40*Q/80+15*MT/MTT+35*F/FT

Where LP is the total points earned from both lab papers, Q is the total points earned from 8 best quizzes and Lab skills questions, MT is the earned Mid-term score, MTT is the total possible points on the Mid Term, F is the earned final exam score and FT is the total points possible on the final exam.

A student $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{T}$ s score for the various components listed above will be combined with the indicated weights to produce an overall percentage for the course, which will be used to determine the course letter grade. The conversion between course percentage and letter grade is given below.

Course Outcomes

- 1. Explain the concepts and steps associated with 2D seismic data processing, e.g., scaling, velocity analysis, computing static and dynamic (normal move-out) time corrections, sorting and data gathers, stacking, frequency-wavenumber filtering, surface-consistent methods, seismic data migration using raytracing and using the wave equation, pre-stack migration.
- 2. Explain the various concepts and equations associated with 2D discrete and continuous signals, e.g., 2D Fourier transforms and frequency-wavenumber spectra, convolution, correlation, spatial aliasing, 2D filters, analyzing geophysical data in the frequency-wavenumber domain.
- 3. Mathematically calculate various quantities associated with 2D discrete and continuous signals, e.g., 2D Fourier transforms, convolutions, correlations, and filter components.
- 4. Use the equations and formulas from multidimensional data analysis and processing, and the related mathematics, to solve problems and derive new equations and formulas.
- 5. Write computer programs and use commerical mathematical and computational software to calculate various quantities, such as 2D Fast Fourier transforms, convolutions, correlations, and filter components, and to perform the data processing steps mentioned in outcome 1, and to solve problems in multidimensional geophysical data analysis and processing.
