### Introduction to Primatology and Human Evolution - Spring 2012

#### **Course Description:**

This course starts by examining the mechanism and philosophical implications of biological evolution. We then survey the Order Primates, and examine what it is about the Order, to which we as humans belong, that makes it unique among other mammalian taxa. Finally, we will apply our working knowledge of evolutionary principles to examine the origins of hominins and their subsequent evolution over the past 6 million years that eventually leads to modern humans.

**Required Textbook:** *A Human Voyage: Exploring Biological Anthropology*. Anne Keenleyside and Richard Lazenby. 2011. Nelson Education.

#### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

**Term Test 1: May 24 (30%)** – This test will be multiple choice format and will cover all preceding lecture materials (including videos) and chapters 1 - 4 of the text book.

**Term Test 2: June 7 (30%)** - This test will be multiple choice format (same as Term Test 1) and will cover all lecture materials since Term Test 1 and chapters 5 & 6 of the text book.

**Cumulative Final Exam: Registrar scheduled (40%)** - This test will be multiple choice format and will cover all lecture and textbook materials since the beginning of class, with an emphasis on materials discussed since Term Test 2 and chapters 7 to 12 of the text book.
