COURSE DESCRIPTION

Understanding evolution and the evolution of our species, *Homo sapiens*, is fundamental for anthropology, biology, anatomy, and life sciences. This course will explore the basics of natural selection, genetics, and evolution to identify evolutionary trends leading to modern human diversity. Topics covered in this course include non-human primates, the human fossil record, human skeletal variation, population genetics, growth and development, and morphological variation. Students will gain knowledge in how evolution works and how evolution influenced the way we are today.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Understand evolution and the development of current evolutionary theory.
- Know about primates and understand the difference between apes and monkeys.
- Understand how humans relate to other primates.
- Be able to describe how humans are unique within the hominoids.

- Be able to synthesize early hominin evolution and details about fossil taxa.
- Be able to synthesize Pleistocene hominin evolution and details about fossil taxa.
- Understand modern human variation and the factors that lead to our diversity.
- Understand how cultural evolution influenced hominin evolution.
- Understand how humans are evolving today.
- Use critical assessment and communication skills to understand research papers.

COURSE POLICIES

This course will be taught asynchronously. The lectures will be uploaded in advance and you will be able to watch them on your own schedule. A suggested schedule has been provided below.

Quizzes will have 'target' due dates throughout the term (see class schedule below) but will be open the entire term until June 15. These quizzes are intended to help you study and will be open book (textbook, online, notes, lectures), and will be multiple choice, true or false, and matching questions. Quizzes will not be accepted after June 15th.

Wikipedia pages - you will be organized into groups and choose a topic to create two fake Wikipedia pages with your peers. These pages will be created on GoogleDocs and your participation and contributions will be visible through the doc history. Failure to contribute will result in loss of marks. This should be a fun activity and you are encouraged to be creative. Pages should include references, which will require reading academic research papers, and figures/images (also referenced). Topics will be announced at a later date.

The final exam will be culminative and held on D2L. It will be open for one day (date announced later) and will be designed to take 2 hours, and you will be given 3 hours to complete it once you start. The exam will be open book (textbook, online, notes, lectures). It will consist of multiple choice, true or false, and matching questions, as well as short answer questions. Although it is open book, copying and pasting answers from another source or have AI write your answers for you will be considered academic misconduct and will be treated as such (See https://www.ucalgary.ca/legal-services/university-policies-procedures/student-academic-misconduct-policy).
