TEACHING STYLE

We will be together for five hours a week. To keep us all interested and engaged I encourage student participation through responding to questions, asking questions, and class and small-group discussions. You'll learn more if you participate, and you'll have more fun.

Anthropology is about human beings in all our variety. In order to best represent the variations and similarities of our species I will make use of videos (some film-length and some short clips), images, and audio resources.

The job of an anthropologist is to observe, participate, and take copious notes. I have designed this course so that you will be required to take notes during the lectures. Sometimes the readings and lectures will overlap considerably, at other times not so much. I recommend doing the readings in advance of the lectures to increase your level of comfort with the material, and in contributing to discussions.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course takes a comparative approach to the ways people order their lives, and structure and give meaning to their experiences through gender, class, race, ethnicity, kinship, religion, language and so on. It looks at how human experience, including our own, is embedded within particular historical and cultural processes.

Emphasis will be on the diversity of human cultures and what is common to our species. This course will also emphasize the continuing relevance of anthropological examination and analysis in a globalizing world.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course you will:

1. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the concepts, theories, methods and central issues of social and cultural anthropology that will form the basis for future studies in socio-cultural anthropology and the social sciences in general.

2. Apply anthropological principles, methods, and concepts to engender a critical thinking about Western culture and society.
3. Demonstrate an appreciation of the social and cultural diversity resulting from the variety of ways people have organised their lives and given meaning to their environment and their experiences.
4. Demonstrate the links between the individual, their social world, and global processes.

LECTURE AND READING SCHEDULE

The grade in this course will be determined on the basis of two midterm exams and one final exam. Exams are NOT cumulative. All exams are multiple choice.
