

# ANTH 311 (LEC01) Primate Behaviour GFC Hours 3-0 Spring 2024

#### Prerequisite(s): None

#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

Primate behaviour and related topics, including social dynamics, sociobiology, socio-ecology, dominance, aggression, kinship, sexual behaviour, socialization, learning, cognition, communication, ape language, and conservation. Course Objectives: This course will cover the fundamentals of primate behaviour research and theory, including evolution, social dynamics, socio-ecology, dominance, aggression, kinship, sexual behaviour, reproductive strategies, cognition, communication and conservation. You will learn primate taxonomy and be able to apply these concepts to conceptualize and describe ecological and behavioural variation exhibited across primate groups.

#### COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND ASSESSMENT

Evaluation for this course will be in-person and closed book. Assessments include 2 mid-term exams and 1 final exam. All exams will be multiple-choice (which may include 'true or false' questions).

**Test 1 – 33.3% - May 21:** This exam will cover all lectures, videos and assigned readings to date (May 7 – May 16). There will be a class/movie after the test.

**Test 2 – 33.3% - June 4:** This exam will cover all lectures, videos and assigned readings from May 21 [Movie] – May 30). There will be a class/movie after the test.

**Final Exam – 33.4%- SET BY THE REGISTRAR June 19-22:** The final exam is not cumulative. This exam covers all lectures, movies, required readings and testable videos from June 4[Movie] – June 13.

#### **Important Exam Information**

- The tests for this class are 'closed' book.
- Students will have 1 attempt per test.
- MISSED MID-TERM EXAMS: In the event of missing a mid-term test, contact the instructor within 48 hours of the missed exam. Missed examinations/tests cannot be made up without the approval of the instructor. Students who miss a test/exam have up to 48 hours to contact the instructor to ask for a makeup test/exam. It is at the instructor's discretion if they will allow a make-up exam (the format of which may be different from the original exam).
