COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course will cover the fundamentals of primate behaviour research and theory, including: evolution, social dynamics, socio-biology, socio-ecology, dominance, aggression, kinship, sexual behaviour, reproductive strategies, cognition, and communication. The duration of study is 3 hours per week for 13 weeks and there are no prerequisites to take this course but the student must be in their second year of study.

REQUIRED TEXT: Primate Behavioral Ecology by Karen Strier, 4th Edition, 2010

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Term Test One -30%: February 7th - This test will be multiple choice and short answer format and will cover all preceding lecture materials and chapters 1-3 of the text book.

Term Test Two – 30%: March 13th - This test will be multiple choice and short answer format (same as Term Test One) and will cover lecture materials since Term Test One and chapters 4-8 of the text book.

Cumulative Final Exam -40%: Registrar scheduled - This test will cover the entire text book and all lecture materials during the term. It will also be multiple choice and short answer format.

Please note that ALL lecture materials will be covered in exams and this includes videos, lectures, discussions, and guest lectures. Students will need to attend class to do well in the course. Lecture notes will be posted on Blackboard and can be printed before class to assist in note-taking. The text book material is related and complementary to lecture material. However, lectures will not be tightly tied to the text book and both need to be mastered to do well on exams. Students should read the text and play close attention to areas where it overlaps with the lectures.

<u>Academic Accommodations</u> – It is the students' responsibility to request academic accommodations. If you are a student with a documented disability who may require academic accommodations and have not registered with the Disability Resource Centre, please contact

Missed Exams – Missed tests automatically receive a score of zero. Returned Exams – Exams will not be returned to the student but can be reviewed during office hours or by appointment. Marks will be posted on Blackboard not less than one week after exams are taken. An answer key for the exam will also be posted on Blackboard. After reviewing the key and your notes, if you feel that you were marked unfairly or that marks were missed on your exam, you are asked to prepare a short statement explaining the problem. The question will then be re-graded and marks adjusted (up or down as is warranted) at the instructor's discretion.

No accommodation will be made for poor performance on exams. For instance, additional items cannot be submitted in lieu of exams and grades will not be curved. Be sure that you are well-prepared for exams so that you perform well when you have the opportunity.

Classroom Regulations:

- Please arrive to class on time. If you are late, sit at the back to minimise disruption. The
 instructor will be careful not to run overtime so asks that you stay seated until the end of
 class.
- To be fair to students sitting near you, do not converse with others during lectures. Lecture material will be covered on exams.
