Evaluation

Evaluation for this course will include two mid-term exams and one final exam. All exams will be multiple-choice and short answer (which may include matching questions, true/false questions, fill in the blank, writing a paragraph or few sentences).

Mid-Term Exam I-30% - Feb 5

Mid-Term Exam II - 30%- Mar 29

This exam will cover all lectures, videos and assigned readings (Chapters 4—pages 98 to 105 only; 5, 6, 7 (to 188 only), and 8) to date (Feb 12 – Mar 12)

Final Exam - 40%- SET BY THE REGISTRAR April 17; 19-29

The final exam is cumulative. This exam will cover all lectures and assigned readings to date, as well as Chapters 9, 10, 11 and 12. It covers movies from Mar 29 – April 9 only.
