INTRODUCTION TO PHYSICAL ANTHROPOLOGY**

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Course Description:

This course surveys the scope, goals and major discoveries of physical anthropology, dealing particularly with human biological evolution, the hominin fossil record and present physical diversity. Labs provide students with exercises and assignments that focus on specific concepts discussed in lectures and readings.

Prerequisite: None

Archaeology 203 Laboratory Manual. *Lab Manual for Physical Anthropology*. (The manual will be posted on D2L – students need to download weekly exercises to bring to labs each week. **Labs begin in the second week of classes**).

Lab Participation:

Students are required to participate in data collection and provision of data in the Anthropometry Lab. Students should acquaint themselves with requirements in advance of the lab.

Students do not need to pass every course component in order to pass the course, however,

Plagiarism

Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work as if it were the student's own work when it is not. Any ideas or materials taken from another source written, electronic, or oral must be fully and formally acknowledged. Plagiarism includes but is not limited to:

- (a) The work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- (b) Parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- (c) The whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or,
- (d) A student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted. Plagiarism is an extremely serious academic offence. It is recognized that clause (d) does not prevent a graduate student incorporating work previously done by him or her in a thesis or dissertation.
