This course surveys the great civilizations of the ancient world, including Egypt, Mesopotamia, the Indus Valley, China, Mesoamerica, and South America. Emphasis will be placed on how archaeologists relate material culture (i.e., artifacts) to interpretations of cultural practice, and the processes of culture change by which complex societies evolved in diverse parts of the globe. Lectures will be illustrated with the art, architecture, and artifacts of past civilizations in order to expose students to how "material culture" embodies human experience and thereby provides a window on the past.

REQUIRED TEXTS:

Ancient Civilizations (3rd edition), by Christopher Scarre and Brian Fagan (2008), Pearson/Prentice Hall, Upper Saddle River, NJ.

GRADING:

Grades will be based on pop quizzes (20 pts), two short essays (20 pts each), and a final essay (40 pts), totaling 100 points. An additional 10 pts can be awarded for attending Anthropology and Archaeology (ANARKY) lectures and submitting a short paragraph about **what you learned**. (1 pt per lecture to a maximum of 10). Individual grades will be based on total points received:

PAPERS:

Two short essays on a paper topic selected from a list provided in class. A research paper should involve at least 5 published sources (not including the textbook). The paper should be short (2-5 pages) and concise.

Final Essay on a topic of your choice. The topic has to be approved by March 18 via email. There is no length requirement, but you must use 10 references (not your textbook). Paper topics may include such themes as sites, artifact classes, or cultural practices.

References – use the American Anthropology Association (AAA) guidelines (http://www.aaanet.org/publications/style_guide.pdf) (or email with your alternative).

IMPORTANT: Plagiarism, defined as copying more than 5 words in succession or using information without adequate citation (i.e., reference and page number) of the original source, is a violation of academic integrity. Research papers that plagiarize will receive a 0 score, and the student will be identified to the Dean of the Faculty of Arts for possible expulsion (see page 49 of the U of Calgary Calendar).
