COURSE DESCRIPTION

In 'The Archaeology of Greece and Rome', we examine 4000 years of archaeological evidence for the cultures that lived in the regions of modern Italy and Greece through the Bronze Age, the Iron Age, and the Roman Empire. Course material will focus on aspects of Minoan, Cycladic, Mycenean, Etruscan, Greek, and Roman civilizations. Lectures will adopt an archaeological perspective relying on material evidence of the past that includes artifacts, sites, and landscapes. Students will gain an appreciation for the deep and inter-connected history of these regions through various types of material evidence while acknowledging, but not granting primacy to, the historical record and art history.

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Develop a basic understanding of the culture history of Greece and Italy from the Bronze Age to the Roman Empire.
- Understand and identify the basic classes of material evidence that facilitate

archaeological interpretation of these societies.

- Employ basic interpretive skills on archaeological material in a Mediterranean context.
- Appreciate the core differences between archaeological and historical interpretations of the past.
- Discuss challenges to how archaeologists gain and disseminate knowledge
- Demonstrate the relevance of archaeology to the modern world

REQUIRED READINGS AND TEXTBOOKS:

There is no assigned textbook for this course. However, a reading list will be provided on D2L. The readings need not be completed prior to their corresponding lecture. However, they must be read prior to the exam in which they are covered. Further details are provided in the reading list on D2L.

The evaluative materials for this course consist of four exams and three online assignments.

The final exam will be scheduled by the registrar. Exam formats will vary and may consist of multiple choice, definitions, matching, and/or short answer. Exams will cover lecture content and assigned weekly readings from the learning period preceding each exam. Later exams may necessarily build upon concepts and information that have presented throughout the class. All exams are closed book.

Assignments will require students to use online resources to answer questions related to archeological data, investigation, and interpretation. Students need not pass all components of the course to receive a passing grade for this class. Each assignment will be in .docx format and submitted through the D2L Dropbox. Late assignments are subject to a 10% penalty per day late, including holidays and weekends. After 5 days, the assignment will receive a grade of zero.

You must provide advance notice to the instructor if you are unable to take an exam. If you miss an exam you must contact the instructor within **48 hours** of the scheduled exam. Exams may only be deferred in the case of serious illness or medical emergency, religious observance, or domestic affliction. Travel plans or a misreading of the syllabus are not valid reasons for requesting a deferred exam. If approved by the instructor, a makeup test/exam must be written within **two weeks** of the missed test/exam on a day/time scheduled by the instructor.
