COURSE DESCRIPTION

In 'Stone, Bronze, and Iron: The Archaeology of Europe Before Rome', we examine over one million years of archaeological evidence for the cultures that lived in Europe through the Paleolithic, Mesolithic, Neolithic, Chalcolithic, Bronze Age, the Iron Age. Course material will focus on aspects of human evolution, cognition, material culture. art. climate. settlement. architecture, and changing lifeways. Lectures will adopt an archaeological perspective relying on material evidence of the past that includes artifacts, sites, and landscapes. Students will gain an appreciation for the deep history of Europe as reflected in the archaeological record by outlining the main characteristics of each period while discussing famous sites and artifacts.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of this course, students will be expected to:

- Develop a basic understanding of the culture history of Europe from the Paleolithic to the Iron Age.
- Understand and identify the basic classes of material evidence that facilitate archaeological interpretation of these periods.
- Employ basic interpretive skills for archaeological sites and material culture in a European context using methods and theories discussed in class.

EVALUATIVE METHODS

Students will be evaluated through four assignments and four exams. There is no final Exam. Exam formats may vary and consist of multiple choice, definitions, and/or short answer. Exams will cover lecture content and assigned weekly readings from the learning period preceding. Later exams may necessarily build upon concepts and information that have presented throughout the class. All exams are closed book. Assignments will require students to use online resources to answer questions related to archeological data, investigation, and interpretation. Students need not pass all components of the course to receive a passing grade.
