## Official Course Description

Human perceptions and uses of the built environment, particularly residential architecture. The emphasis is on the structure and symbolism associated with the spatial arrangements of objects, activities, and social interactions.

#### **Course Objectives**

Household archaeology focuses on human perceptions and uses of the built environment, namely residential architecture which is associated with the household, one of the smallest units of co-residence, economic cooperation and social reproduction. To understand the evolution of households, archaeologists attempt to reconstruct the demography, nature and social relationships of households through detailed analyses of the architectural remains and their contents. The spatial arrangements of objects, activities, and social interactions also provide information on the ideology and social organization of households. In this course, we review past and present definitions of the household, particularly as these relate to the basic unit of co-residence and examine domestic architecture as a reflection of group sedentism, of household demography and status, of domestic social interaction, and of group ideology. We also outline the shortcomings of earlier models and evaluate the merits of current approaches to this problem. Course content includes households of mobile and sedentary groups with examples from ethnographic accounts and archaeological reports from around the world with a slight emphasis on the Americas.

Students will also be asked to agree on the due dates for the selected components of the course after they have had a chance to review their workloads in other courses.

**There is no scheduled final exam in this course.** It is **NOT** essential to pass all components to pass the course as whole. For all open book exams, students have permission to access course notes, e-texts, or online resources but they will **NOT** be permitted to cut and paste information directly from these sources.

Instead, students **MUST** answer the questions by expressing their ideas and those of others in their own words. Late assignment Late assignments will be assessed a **5%** penalty per day.
