Course description:	An examination of art and architecture before 1400 CE in relation to significant historical and cultural events.

Course Objectives:	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: 1. recognize and analyze principles, strategies, and themes in the art and architecture of diverse global cultures before 1400 CE; 2. identify and structure thematic connections between artworks / architectural settings within a conceptual framework; 3. identify, discuss and explain pertinent examples from the textbook in relation to the lecture material; 4. discuss similarities and connections of historical works pertaining to the course framework to contemporary visual culture; 5. conduct art historical research with serious, appropriate and reliable sources; 6. reflect on their learning.
