Course Description:

A chronological examination of art and architecture in northern Europe from c. 1600 to 1789.

Prerequisite(s): *Art History 203 or consent of the Department.*

Objectives of the Course:

Critical examination of art historical ideas and movements within a framework of historical knowledge and understanding. The student will be expected to (1) gain an understanding of the intellectual foundations of art and architecture and the various forces in history that gave rise to, and have shaped, the Age of the Baroque and (2) to develop an explicit awareness and understanding of the development and operation of the important institutions (social, religious, economic and political) and cultural, social and individual values which both define and constrain the 17th and the 18th century.

Text books and Readings:

There are no assigned readings or assigned texts. Instead the student **is** expected to use all available resources at the University of Calgary as well as on the internet and/or meet with me on an individual or group basis during those days designated in the course outline.

Course Activities:

A combination of slide lectures and films will be used to define topics for discussion. Lectures will last approximately 50 minutes with the remaining time devoted to answering questions and further discussions. The student is expected to read and to know all the material presented in the classroom. They will be responsible for knowing specific art works and the pertinent information surrounding those artworks. Although class attendance is not mandatory it will be difficult, if not impossible, to do well academically if too many classes are missed. Careful note taking is particularly necessary since there is no assigned text book; however, a student must have the ability to decide what is or not necessary to know. It is assumed that the student has a good working knowledge of High and Late Renaissance Art and Architecture and 17th Century Italian Art and Architecture. If not, we shall present a brief survey of the significant points. Nearly all of the works of art discussed in class may be found either in basic survey books, the Image Center in the MacKimmie Library Block 040 or on the

Since there are no assigned texts the following days will be designated 'study days' during which time the student is expected to use available resources at the University of Calgary including the library and internet and/or meet with me on an individual or group basis. This will allow the student the benefits of blended and experiential learning.
