Course Description

A chronological examination of European painting and sculpture from the late eighteenth century through the Romantic period.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Art History 203 or consent of the Department.

Objectives of the Course

In addition to gaining knowledge of important artists of the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, as well as key artworks produced in a range of geographical contexts (across Europe and North America) students will also learn how to critically view works of art (including paintings, sculpture and graphic satire) for ideologies related to gender, class and race. Critical theories and methodologies such as feminism and postcolonial theory will be addressed and employed during lectures and in-class discussions. Although this is a lecture course, students will be expected to come to class prepared to discuss the artists, artworks and issues covered in the readings.

Upon satisfactory completion of the course the student will have gained an understanding of:

- Historical and social factors that affected art production and techniques in the early modern period;
- Important museums and museum collections housing eighteenth and nineteenth century art resources;

- A culturally integrated approach to the visual arts (including painting, sculpture, architecture, printmaking and photography);
- How art, politics, and society influence and interact with the visual arts;
- techniques of research and critical writing with respect to art history;
- methods and materials in art history.

Required text: Michelle Facos, *An Introduction to Nineteenth-Century Art* (Routledge, 2011).

The first assignment will involve preparing a 500-word biographical entry on an artist of the period that you will choose from a list provided.

For the second assignment, you will be attempting to create an artwork in the style of your chosen artist; this will be accompanied by a 1,500-2,000 word essay describing the artist's

style and how your “forgery” fits this.

The final essay (also 1,500-2,000 words) will require you to consider how your artist's work might be considered problematic given contemporary critical perspectives such as feminism. Assignment specifics will be circulated separately in class. In general, assignments must be double-spaced and single-sided, printed in black ink on white paper, with the student's name clearly indicated at the front or the top of the page. Staples are preferred; binding and title pages are not necessary.

Note: It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment. Please hand in your assignments directly to your instructor. If this is not possible, you can use the drop box outside of AB 608. Assignments that are put into the drop box will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox.

A passing grade on every component of the course is essential if the student is to pass the course as a whole.

Registrar-Scheduled Final Exam – YES

The exam will cover the chronological era covered by the course, and consist of multiple-choice, slide-ID, matching, and short-answer questions derived from the textbook and lecture content. It will be closed-book, and no aids (notes, textbooks, etc.) will be permitted.

Late Assignment Policy

Assignments are due at the beginning of class on the indicated date.

Late assignments will be penalized with the loss of one (1) mark *per day* (including weekends) after the deadline. For example, if you receive 25/30 on an assignment, but the assignment was two days late, the final grade will be 23/30.
