Course Description

A critical analysis of the power dynamics inherent to forms of looking and representations of the body in a variety of historical periods and geographical locations. May include gendered representations, the medicalized body, the body in classical art, and displays of marginalized bodies.

Note: this course uses the history of art, modernity, and tourism to question whose bodies and what body of objects are mobile, valued, and mis-/under-/over-represented within modern and contemporary histories. As such, the materials of this course approach the concept of "the body" in multiple forms: the body of art, the body of tourism, the body of the souvenir, the body of mobility, and the body of modernity.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Prerequisite(s): 3 units from <u>Art History 331</u>, <u>333</u>, <u>357</u> and 3 additional units of courses labelled Art History at the 300 level or above.

Objectives of the Course

Students who successfully complete this course will demonstrate:

- sophisticated understanding of the methodologies of art history and visual studies in relation to theories of art and the body;
- 2. strong capacity to undertake evaluations of art and cultural objects;
- 3. high-level ability to assess art and cultural objects in both written and verbal discussions:
- advanced comprehension of creative and scholarly literature;

- 5. developed capability to contextualize art and cultural objects in relation to social, political, economic, and cultural contexts;
- 6. and comprehension of the contingency of creating history and knowledge, and openness to critical self-reflection.

Textbooks and Readings

There are no required textbooks for this course. The assigned readings are a combination of book chapters, exhibition reviews, journal articles, and artist statements. These readings are available through the course's D2L site.

From week to week, you may be asked to look at websites that relate to the artists we will be discussing. These will be assigned at least a week before the class to which they relate.

Assignments and Evaluation

From week 2 until week 7 of the semester, students are expected to complete a list of readings related to the theme of the week's class. That amounts to six weeks of readings. At the start of class time for each of these weeks, a quiz will be posted on the class's D2L site that engages you in some of the issues that were raised in the readings. You will have 24-hours to complete these quizzes. And while you will complete six quizzes, your final grade includes only the five quizzes in which you score the highest. Each quiz is worth 5% of your final grade.
