Course description:	Foundation course in two-dimensional art making. Creative exploration of pictorial space, composition and design will occur via learning fundamentals of perspective, color, shape, balance and unity. Approaches may include wet and dry media, digital technologies, printmaking, and collage. These will be addressed in the context of research, problem solving, visual fluency and conceptual development.

Course Objectives:	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: 1. Understand concepts and processes related to two-dimensional design in relation to historic and contemporary practices. 2. Demonstrate an introductory understanding and application of formal elements and two- dimensional design principles through the completion of all course assignments, and in-class discourse. 3. Increase confidence through experimentation with a range of two-dimensional media including, but not limited to, drawing, collage, digital media and photography, etc. 4. Have been provided with the opportunity to work both individually and collaboratively in the development of artwork that is original, embraces experimentation and creative problem-solving skills. 5. Gain the basics of visual literacy (vocabulary and terminology) for the analysis of artworks. 6. Communicate respectfully and collaborate with peers in a positive, safe online-classroomatmosphere that supports the sharing of ideas through discussions and critiques.

Assignments & Evaluation

Learning Tasks (25%; graded equally)

These are short projects to re-enforce subjects covered in class; these tasks shouldn't take more than a couple hours to complete. The Due dates are each Monday before the class starts. All Learning Tasks are to be submitted to designated D2L dropboxes. No credit will be given to any Learning Tasks submitted to the dropbox late.

Weekly Assignments (65%)

Student will have approximately 1 week (excluding the final assignment) to complete these assignments. Assignments will be introduced on the Monday of each week. These are longer projects that will allow students to physically exercise concepts and ideas presented in class. All Assignments are to be submitted to designated D2L dropboxes. No credit will be given to any Assignments submitted to the dropbox late.

An oral and written reflection will be required for each Assignment; The oral reflection is the students' engagement in-class discussion. The written reflection should be 250 words. This written component will be assessed based on written communication skills and depth of critical self-inquiry into and use of critical language in course work. Individual reflection guides will be given for each Assignment, providing questions and criteria for each written portion. Assignment reflections are worth 3% of the total assignment percentage.

Final Project/Exhibition (10%): Art Critique sessions and the final group exhibition will be graded based on each student's engagement and final work.
