Course description:	Foundation course in three-dimensional art making. Creative exploration may include media such as plaster, clay, wood, and found objects. Technical approaches may include mold-making, casting, additive and subtractive processes. Form, mass, volume and materials will be addressed in the context of research, problem solving, visual fluency and conceptual development.
Prerequisites and/or co- requisites:	None
Course Objectives:	Upon successful completion of the course students will demonstrate understanding and competency in the areas of: 1. the formal elements and principles of three-dimensional design. 2. the vocabulary of three-dimensional design and visual expression. 3. the application of diverse studio media for three-dimensional design. 4. meaning in visual imagery encompassing form, style, content and evolving metaphor. 5. creative practice and creative development. 6. creative practice in the development of original work using a variety of media and methods.
Required Textbooks of Readings:	There is no required textbook.
Course Schedule:	Term begins, Tuesday September 7 th Classes: May involve walks & discussions outdoors, the use of paints, glues, clay and other potentially messy activities. Please dress in comfortable clothes suitable for these kinds of activities. Students must provide their own respirator masks if they wish to make use of fixatives or other aerosols in the Art Department spray booth. Assignment 1 Found Object / Eco Art	Using small scale found objects students will create a meaningful image by achieving unity with a variety of elements. Students will explore topics related to climate change, sustainable living and circular economies. The whole project will be disassembled and recycled at the end of the course. Assignment 2 Clay relief tiles with option of glazing or creating a plaster of Paris cast (positive).	Students will practice using additive and / or subtractive methods in clay to create relief tiles. Students have the option of glazing the tiles or creating plaster cast positives. Students will explore natural or human-made objects to create impressions; practice hand-building techniques in clay; and select either glazing or plaster cast making to create meaningful images on a topic of their own choosing. Assignment 3 Colour Theory & Paper Sculpture	Students will explore the works of contemporary sculptors and challenge themselves to use complimentary, analogous and split compliment colour schemes before manipulating paper into abstract forms that demonstrate unity, chaos or rhythm.
