Assignment 1: Linear Sculpture – 2D to 3D Transformation	Focusing on line, as an element of art and design, students make a piece out of either aluminum wire or metal rod, or a combination of both (addition of other linear materials is optional).	May 11, 2022	20%
Assignment 2: Replication – Material Translation	Applying alginate mold making technique, students replicate or reproduce a body part or an object. The outcome can be included in Assignment 4.	May 25, 2022	20%
Assignment 3: Environmental Art	Thinking of Ephemerality and one's relation to land, students make a piece in relation to the nature or environment, using primarily natural found objects.	June 6, 2022	20%
Assignment 4: Assemblage – 3D collage	Considering Bill Brown's discussion of "Object" vs "Thing", students make a Joseph Cornell inspired wooden Artwork Box.	June 15, 2022	30%

Assessment expectations:	Guidelines for Submitting Assignments: Projects should be submitted at the beginning of the Due Date class, before the Group Critique. Each student will be given 5-10 minutes to

present their work. The rest of the class are expected to participate in the group critique by sharing some feedback, asking questions, commenting on what they think is really successful or what can be improved, etc.

Please submit final projects **both** in person in our classroom at the start of our class, **and** submit a digital copy to the appropriate submission folder in D2L.

Missed or Late Assignments: Late assignments will be penalized 5% per day (For instance if there is a 1-day long delay, the assignment mark will be out of 95% instead of 100%, or if there is a 2-day long delay, the mark will be out of 90% and so on).

Late penalties are not recoverable. In some cases, absence may be justifiable; students are urged to consult the instructor BEFORE the deadline.

Expectations for Writing: Each assignment must be accompanied by a one-paragraph (around 150 words) rationale in which students write about their submitted piece. These writings won't be evaluated separately, but are a mandatory component of the project. The paragraph may include some or all of the following:

- Formal specifications (discussing applied elements and principles)
- Content (ideas, concepts, and meanings)
- How Form and Content are related in the process of meaning production
- Procedures and methodology (including brainstorming, any technical challenges, etc.)
- If and how the student was inspired by certain artists/artworks
- And so on...

#### **Grading Rubric for Each Assignment**

- Successful Execution of Assignment: Have the material, technical, formal and conceptual requirements outlined in the assignment description been met? (25%)
- Quality of Craftsmanship: The finished work should demonstrate care and control over the use of materials, processes, tools, and techniques. (25%)
- Creativity/Unique Response to Assignment Requirements: Does the work
  demonstrate effort by the student to go beyond the most basic assignment
  criteria and make the work "their own?" The submitted work should demonstrate
  a willingness to experiment and take risks. Innovation and creativity are highly
  encouraged. (25%)
- Time Management: The submitted assignment should reflect if the work's level of "finish", complexity, ambition, and commitment is appropriate to the time allotted to complete it. (25%)
