Course Description

An introductory course in current photographic methods, including digital photography, digital image processing and the presentation of photographs.

Notes: * Students are required to have access to a personal computer, Adobe Photoshop and their own digital single lens reflex camera that shoots a proprietary form of RAW for the duration of the term. For Nikon this is an NEF file, for Canon this is a CR2 or CR3 file. See below for further information.

** Please note, due to COVID-19 no on-campus computer lab will be available this semester.

*** Lenses with wide angle (18 mm to 55 mm) and telephoto (55 mm to 250 mm) capabilities (or equivalent) are recommended but not mandatory.

Objectives of the Course

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be familiar with the rudiments of digital photography and will have developed the technical skills necessary to produce quality photographic images. In addition, the student will be introduced to post-processing, using a combination of software such as Adobe Photoshop and Adobe Bridge and gain some understanding of the expressive potential of the photographic medium.

- Access to Adobe Photoshop for the duration of the course

- Students may wish to use a headset for Zoom meetings but this is not mandatory

Evaluation Criteria (Rubrics)

Please note the following important information:

-this a course where you will practice making photographic images in an art context -you will learn about basic DSLR camera features in order to make creative images <u>based on</u> <u>specific assignment goals</u>

- you will learn how to do <u>basic editing</u> (this is an introductory course) using Adobe Photoshop
- any photographs submitted for marks in this course **must be taken by you, taken this semester** for each assignment specifically, and must be shot using a DSLR in its proprietary RAW mode.
-you **may not submit photographs that you've taken before the start of this course**-you may not submit photographs that were not shot specifically for each assignment, as assigned
-university level English writing is expected in weekly discussion posts including the use of proper sentence structure, spelling, capitalization, punctuation and citations (MLA, Chicago or APA may be used).

Learning Task 1- Question of the Day Responses Rubric:

Learning Task 1: Written / Visual or Short Answer Responses (11 responses, 2.5 points each / 2.5% each). This is a weekly task that is marked as either done or not done. 2.5 points will be awarded for each complete response. Zero points will be awarded for each missed or inadequate

response. I will be marking posts each week however post points will **NOT** be communicated weekly but a total will be provided at the end of term.

*If you have not received an email from me letting you know about errors in a specific post, then you have received your full points for that post. Please keep track of your post points as we go throughout the weeks to know your score.

Inadequate responses include: written responses that are off-topic, incorrect, plagiarized, too short, too long, insincere (sarcastic), point form, derogatory in any way, and / or with many spelling, capitalization, punctuation, sentence structure or grammatical errors (for a few examples). University level English is required.

For work in progress photographic posts, inadequate responses would include posting an image(s) that is unrelated to the topic, out of focus, more than 1 stop over or under exposed, over-processed, edited with filters or effects, not shot <u>by you</u>, not <u>shot specifically for this course</u>, or that has been <u>submitted once before already</u>.

Please use full sentences, your own words (when a written response is asked for) and citations for any quotes, paraphrases or ideas / images that are not your own. Please use MLA, APA or Chicago (your choice).

Respond to the "Question of the Day" by Sunday of the same week at 11 pm in the designated Discussions area in D2L each week.

Please feel free to 'be yourself' but do remember this is a university course and you should not write anything here that you would not say out loud in a regular class setting. Please make sure to post thoughtful, honest comments that help us to get to know each other and that move our weekly discussions forward, just as they would in a classroom setting.

Learning Task 2, Photographic Assignments Rubric:

All photographic assignment rubric points will be gauged according to the 'best practices' taught in class and / or assigned in the course readings and resources.

<u>When</u> proprietary RAW file formats are required to be submitted, this means shot in your camera's native, lossless RAW file extension. This does <u>not</u> mean you can save an image as a .DNG or a .RAW after shooting another file type like a .jpg.

RAW file formats:

Nikon: NEF Canon: CR2 / CR3 Sony: ARW / SR2 / SRF Pentax: PEF

<u>Not</u> acceptable / zero points will be awarded for non-proprietary RAW file submission when it's been asked of you, for example: .DNG / .RAW.

Originality and Improvement: Originality: Has the student chosen an interesting time of day that suits the idea as assigned? Have we seen this image or approach to the topic before in class or elsewhere? Did the student put effort into making an image that explores the topic conceptually, creatively and uniquely?

0/3 = little effort apparent, little if any concept or idea apparent

1/3 = typical outcome, apparent difficulty in finding a great approach for the image, no clear message or idea communicated, little effort towards improvement apparent

2/3 = good effort apparent, some distracting or unresolved elements apparent, good concept beginning to appear, more work towards improvement needed to fully execute idea and or skill

3/3 = great effort, very interesting perspective, exciting to look at and refreshing to see, strong concept related to the assignment briefing, excellent skill shown.

Exposure: Is the image exposed well and / or photographed using a suitable level of available light (with proper white balance)?

0/3= mostly black, or mostly white

1/3= very underexposed or overexposed, and / or unsuitable conditions chosen

2/3= a little underexposed or overexposed, better conditions needed to clearly execute idea

3/3= just right, good details in blacks, whites and mid-tones, colours are clear and not murky, idea / message is clearly executed

Composition / Design: Have you made use of compositional techniques, chosen interesting angles, used principles / elements of design? Have you presented work with good craftsmanship and attention to neatness and detail as noted in class materials?

0/3= little apparent effort, snap-shot like, careless and sloppy or unsuitable presentation. And / or poorly done editing / over or under processing that impacts the appearance of the pixels, clarity, sharpness, colour or overall scene

1/3= not composed very well, a fair idea but difficulty executing it, crooked or poorly executed presentation, poorly done editing / over or under processing that impacts the appearance of the pixels, clarity, sharpness, colour or overall scene

2/3= a good composition but some aspect of it is distracting or unappealing in some way, errors or improvement needed on presentation to fully execute idea, message and design fully. Errors in editing cause some level of distraction that negatively impacts the appearance of the pixels, clarity, sharpness, colour or overall scene 3/3= great composition using rule of thirds and / or principles / elements of design. Clean, straight, and well executed presentation with appropriate and effective editing

Sharpness: have you understood how to focus an image and use depth of field correctly and effectively for the execution of the assignment? Does the chosen area of focus help or hinder the success of the image technically and conceptually? Is the chosen area of focus easily identified and appropriate?

0/3= Out of focus, or razor thin focus at the critical point of focus that makes it difficult to determine where the focus is, and or out of focus all over the image.

1/3= Slightly soft focus at the critical point of focus, a deeper or shallower depth of field is needed or focus was misjudged

2/3= In good sharp focus at critical point of focus but slightly shallow or deep depth so that the idea is negatively impacted

3/3= In good sharp focus at the critical point of focus and having a deep enough depth of field around the main object of the photo and for the idea presented

Total /12 per photographic assignment (times 4)

Writing

University level written work in English is a required component of the evaluation of student work. Proper sentence structure, capitalization, spelling, punctuation and grammar are expected and required.

A passing grade on each particular component of this course is essential for the student to pass the course as a whole. If students miss a required component of the course, they should contact the instructor immediately and steps will be taken in accordance with the late policy.

Additional Information

The course content, instruction and assignments require students to have access to a DSLR (digital single lens reflex) camera with a RAW file format. This may be NEF (Nikon) or CR2 / CR3 (Canon) for example.

The course content, instruction and assignments are based on Adobe Photoshop for basic image editing. No on campus computer lab will be available this semester due to Covid-19 closures.

It is a course requirement for students to have a Digital SLR camera or advanced digital camera with full manual capabilities and RAW file format capabilities.
