Course description:	An introductory course in observational and representational drawing. Creative exploration includes mark-making, hand-eye coordination, proportions, perspective, line, texture, figure-ground relationships, and pictorial composition. Approaches may include pencil, conte, charcoal, pastel, pen and ink. These will be addressed in the context of research, problem-solving, visual fluency, and conceptual development.
Prerequisites and/or co-requisites:	None
Course Objectives:	<p>This course will explore the theory and practice of drawing to produce still life and figure projects, mostly with monochromatic materials.</p> <p>Students will also learn about significant historic and contemporary artists who use drawing as their primary means of creation as well as critical theory that directs the efforts of many artists in this medium.</p> <p>Upon successful completion of this course:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The student will have developed a general working knowledge of foundational concepts relative to drawing, which may include line, shape, value, form, scale, perspective, still life, figure drawing etc. 2. The student will have a working knowledge of several different techniques and materials of drawing including, but not limited to, the use of pencil, conte, charcoal, graphite stick and pen. 3. The student will have been exposed to a variety of concepts and techniques relevant to drawing, which may include still-life, figure drawing, imagination, photography, etc. 4. The student will have been exposed to a variety of course activities such as peer group discussions and activities, and critiques. 5. The student will have demonstrated a capacity to develop unique works through various creative approaches: techniques, problem-solving strategies, experimentation and research/investigative skills.
Required Textbooks or Readings:	A textbook is not required for this course. There will be required readings and supplemental course support materials as assigned in class.

Course Schedule:	<p>There is no final examination in this course. Marks are based on term work and class participation.</p> <p>The main activity for this course consists of daily drawing exercises plus FOUR Project drawings.</p> <p>All drawings from the beginning of term, plus the first two Project assignments, will be due at Midterm. Assessment expectations:	<p>Project and Assignment Grades will be based on the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Evidence of knowledge of 2D art fundamentals as shown in the quality of work. -Skill and craftsmanship. 		

	<p>-Originality and willingness to explore new ideas. -Commitment to the course, weekly classes and deadlines. Full, consistent participation during scheduled class time is expected of all class participants and is a fundamental requirement that will be integrated into the assessment for each learning task.</p> <p>Participation Grade will depend on the following: -The student is expected to be on time for the start of ALL classes, with the appropriate materials at hand. -The student's level of engagement with the instructor and other students by contributing comments and questions during discussions and critiques.</p> <p>Projects and assignments that were due for the Midterm portfolio may be reworked and then re-submitted for a better mark, provided the work is submitted on or before Wednesday, March 30, 2021. After this March 30th date re-submitted work will not be accepted.</p> <p>Missed Assignments and Projects will get a zero grade.</p> <p>Note: It is NOT essential to attain a passing grade on any particular component of the course for the student to pass the course as a whole. Note: It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of any relevant documentation regarding each submitted assignment.</p> <p>Students are responsible for making themselves aware of all assignments and due dates. Absences from class do not excuse students from this responsibility. Materials required may vary from student to student, depending on their response to a given exercise or assignment.</p> <p>Late Assignment Policy. Upon completion, this quiz must be forwarded to the instructor.</p> <p>Initial supplies needed for the first class, Monday, January 10th are: 1 Sketch book (approx. 9" x 11" or larger) - preferably cold press (textured paper rather than smooth); at least 4 pencils with differing degrees of softness (I recommend 8B, 4B, 2B, HB); a ruler (minimum 30 cm in length) and a white eraser.</p> <p>A detailed supply list for the course will be posted to D2L. You will be expected to purchase the necessary materials for your assignments and projects. The total cost for your materials will depend on your ideas.</p> <p>Course Activities Course activities will include lectures, demonstrations, group discussions and creative practice which may involve drawing, painting, collage/assemblage, setting up some still-life situations; to name a few.</p> <p>Critiques There will be two important Critique periods during the term: midterm and final. It is highly recommended that the student prepares for critiques by recording his/her thoughts in their sketchbook prior to each critique.</p>
