Course description:	Introductory course in observational and representational drawing. Creative exploration includes mark-making, hand-eye co-ordination, proportions, perspective, line, texture, figure-ground relationships, and pictorial composition in charcoal. These will be addressed in the context of problem-solving, visual fluency and conceptual development through two large assignments.

Course Objectives:	This course is designed to explore various technical skills in drawing in conjunction with a theme on <i>Consumerism</i> .	
	Students will spend 50% of the in-class time focused on weekly technical training in charcoal on still-life and object as products. The other 50% of in class time is focused on exploring various aspects art criticism in two large assignments, group- critiques, and ways of problem- solving in visual art language in relation to thematic exploration (on consumerism). There are also opportunities to read art exhibitions to see examples of art theory to art practice.	
	Upon satisfactory completion of the course the student will have a basic knowledge of conceptualization in a given them. Students will learn to abstract an idea in the visual language and apply the idea through several cohesive steps in the context of a thematic assignment.

Models: Assessment expectations:	 Guidelines for Submitting Assignments: Students will have two large projects in the term, each project credits 20% of the total grade. Students see 10 past examples of similar topic drawings as visual strategies. Discuss with classmates and instructor about the concept of the working idea. Feedback from the class on the draft 1 of the project, draft 2 will be individual feedback. After students complete a large assignment, students will present the two panels to the class to be reviewed and received a) verbal and b) written form. The panels will be presented in hallways Art Building. Students will receive written feedback from the instructor.
