Course description:	Developing observational and representational skills through figure drawing and exploration of topics in the contemporary field. Approaches will include a more developed understanding of color, research, problem solving, visual fluency and conceptual development.

Course Objectives:	Upon satisfactory completion of the course, the student will have a working visual knowledge of conceptualization on a thematic" The Issues of the Body." Students will learn to abstract an idea in the visual language and apply the concept thro several stages in a cohesive project and in as a social concern in contemporary art. Participation, feedback, and exchanging ideas in friendly classroom interaction and grou critiques will be a significant part of the learning. While daily classes focus on technical skills such as still life, portraiture, and model drawings, two large assignments will explore various social topics of the body (provided the instructor).
