Course Objectives:	By the completion of this course, successful students will:		
	1.Demonstrate an understanding of fundamental printmaking techniques including but not limited to operating an etching press, using a roller/brayer, handling small tools, and editioning prints through the completion of three major projects.		
	2. Demonstrate a comprehensive understanding of linocut, monotype, and drypoint print production through the observation of demonstrations, experimentation with, and creation of prints using each of these media.		
	3. Develop imagery for each project that demonstrates creative vision and individuality through the understanding and application of elements and principles of art.		
	4.Respectfully evaluate their classmate's work, offering supportive formal and conceptual feedback by contributing during discussion and critique.		
	5. Succinctly summarize and communicate formal and conceptual information about their own work, responding in a professional manner to feedback and, when appropriate, employing their peers and instructor's feedback.		
	6. Demonstrate respect for others and themselves by being prepared for class, being punctual and present, effectively communicating, maintaining cleanliness, and working safely and responsibly.		
	7. Gain an understanding of the conceptual potential of printmaking practices within the realm of contemporary art.
