Course Description

Study of recent Canadian art from a range of perspectives in art criticism.

Objectives of the Course

This course will critically reflect on how contemporary Canadian art is articulated and disseminated by artists, institutions, arts journals and media. Emphasis will be on exhibitions that explore the broader contextual frameworks that art and artists are situated within. Each course will focus on a specific artist, context or discipline, which together will overlap and engage with each other. Students will be encouraged to draw their own connections and parallels to the discussions.

The course will consist of discussions, artist presentations and excursions to galleries, artist run centres and public art sites in Calgary. Assigned readings will form the basis of in class discussion and critical reflection. Participants will also be encouraged to seek out and present readings to the class.
