Focuses on concepts, issues, and techniques of video as an art medium. Students will gain Course description: experience and a working knowledge of concept development, video shooting and digital editing, in the context of contemporary art theory and practice Prerequisites and/or co-Art 235 requisites: Notes: Students must provide their own digital video camera for the duration of the term. **Course Objectives:** This course will seek to contextualize a history of video art from the 1950s to present and attempt to establish a critical knowledge of the medium in contemporary art practices. Zoom lectures/discussions and asynchronous screenings will introduce students to some of the key works that have shaped this genre. Theoretical underpinnings from selected texts and discussions will additionally highlight a 'hands-on approach' to the technical components of the course during lab times. The material in this course will enable students to: Explore and discuss the key issues surrounding video technology as it relates to social and cultural theory of the present day. Develop their vocabulary and critical skills when analyzing their own art practice and the work of others. Employ a D-I-Y (Do It Yourself) approach to technical exploration & investigation of materials, both new + old. Consider the role technology plays in our lives, inside and outside of the trajectories of artistic discourse. Required Textbooks of Your camera user manual.
