Course description:	Examination of the work of Net-based artists and investigation of the Internet as a vehicle to extend art and design practice.		
	Internet art (often referred to as net art) is a form of digital artwork distributed via the Internet. The- term Internet art typically does not refer to art that has been simply digitized and uploaded to be viewable over the Internet. This can be done through a web browser, such as images of paintings uploaded for viewing in an online gallery. Rather, this genre relies intrinsically on the Internet to exist, taking advantage of such aspects as an interactive interface and connectivity to multiple social and		
	economic cultures and micro-cultures. It refers to the Internet as a whole, not only to web-

Be familiar with basic techniques in visualization using a computer. Understand basic strategies for interaction design and their implementation. Know how images and sounds are stored on a computer, how they can be created and edited, and their role in creating art works on the Internet.
