Course Description

Electronic visualization involving computer applications in artistic practice.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Art 235

Objectives of the Course

Students will be exposed to a variety of advanced imaging manipulation techniques. After completing the class, students should be able to produce art in their own style using bitmap-based techniques.

Students must receive a passing grade on the Final Exhibition in order to pass the course as a whole.

Writing

Writing is required in two assignments (the student will be required to produce an artistic statement for the Artistic Purpose and Final Exhibition projects.) These will be evaluated both on content and on proper English grammar and spelling. Students who have difficulty with writing should be prepared to consult the resources available on campus to assist with composition.

Please hand in your assignments to the digital drop box, as described in class. The final project should be turned into the instructor. If this is not possible, you can use the drop box outside of AB 608. Assignments that are put into the drop box will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox.

Late Assignment Policy

*Late assignments will receive a grade of zero. Deadlines are firm; late assignments will not be accepted without prior negotiation with the instructor, or with documented illnesses or family emergencies. Documented means a fully explanatory note from an appropriate authority, e.g., physician or counsellor. **In all cases where students do not turn in work on time without such documentation, a grade of zero will be entered into the gradebook for that assignment.** Do not email assignments except by prior arrangement with the instructor; all assignments aside from the final must be uploaded to the digital dropbox.*

Additional Information (if necessary)

You will be expected to obtain a free account on the Dropbox service; as files generated in the class are often large than D2L is comfortable handling, assignment information and submissions will be handled in this manner.

Students are required to own an external USB storage device, such as a USB flash drive or external hard drive, with at least four gigabytes of available storage, and to save their work both in their cloud storage account and on the memory key. Losing a file due to file storage errors is not a valid excuse for not turning homework in.

The final assignment in the class will require roughly \$50 to \$60 in materials costs, as you will be expected to use the IAML computer lab and its printers to produce the finished project.

In addition, students are encouraged to purchase a drawing tablet for their computer (e.g., Wacom); lower- end models are acceptable, but students who intend to pursue further work in digital media may wish to invest in a model that will carry them through future courses. No assignment specifically depends on tablet use.

Course time will not be used to assist students in resolving differences between user interfaces and/or features of various versions of the application.

Live models are not used in this class. However, images of nude figures obtained from other sources may be used by students in their projects.
