Course description:	An introduction to lithographic printmaking.

	1. Demonstrate a thorough understanding of introductory lithographic print practices and concepts by completing two major lithographic print projects.		
	2. Apply and manipulate observed lithographic techniques and processes to express individual artistic vision.		
	3. Develop imagery for each project that shows creative vision and individuality through the understanding and application of elements and principles of art.		
	4. Respectfully evaluate their classmate's work, offering supportive formal and conceptual feedback by contributing during discussion and critique.		
	5. Succinctly summarize and communicate information about their own work, responding in a professional manner to feedback and, when appropriate, employing their peers and instructor's feedback.		
	6. Demonstrate respect for others working in communal spaces by effectively communicating, maintaining cleanliness, and working safely and responsibly.		
	7. Illustrate an understanding of professional print practices by organizing and editioning all required work for each project.		
	8. Gain an understanding of the formal and conceptual potential of lithography within the realm of contemporary art.
