Course description:	Independent studio research and production supported by a research paper for BFA Honours Visual Studies students, culminating in a Thesis Exhibition.		
Prerequisites and/or co- requisites:	Admission to the BFA Honours Visual Studies program.		
Course Objectives:	Through guided studio-based production and reflection, the course complements and enhances creative research produced in ART 561 and ART 563, and will help ensure professional presentation and public dissemination of the Thesis Exhibition. Through a sequence of assignments, you will develop written support material (a		
	research based, thesis support paper) directly related to your creative research. The support paper provides a coherent and articulate context that accounts for the production of your studio work and within which it can be viewed. Such material will be necessary for ongoing artistic projects including exhibitions, grant applications and graduate school applications, etc.		
Required Textbooks of Readings:	There is no textbook assigned for this course but students are encouraged to be familiar with Andrew Marks, <i>Writing for Visual Thinkers: A Guide for Artists and Designers</i> (available electronically from TFDL).
