Course description:	Investigation of contemporary global art theory and criticism.			
Prerequisites and/or co- requisites:	Consent of the Department.			
Course Objectives:	This graduate seminar is designed as an intensive immersion into theoretical and critical texts that have shaped contemporary discourses on art and culture, from foundational essays to recent interventions.			
	The seminar aims to provide students with the critical tools to engage in contemporary debates about art - and to bring thought to bear on creative practice in new and challenging ways. Assigned readings should be approached not only as an opportunity to gain competence and expertise, but also as a field for experimentation.			
	Our core questions will include:			
	What is the relationship between art theory and practice? What are the politics of aesthetics and the aesthetics of politics?			
	What is the place of art within capitalist markets and what is the artwork's relationship to the commodity?			
	How does art reflect upon subjectivity, race, class, and gender? What is the fate of traditional art mediums in our digital age?			
	The seminar is oriented around reading, discussion, and analytical writing. Its practical objectives will be:			
	1) To gain familiarity with a selection of important theoretical approaches to art and culture.			
	 To improve competence in reading and engaging with complex texts. To hone argumentative and critical writing skills 			
	 4) To deliver effective oral presentations and engage productively in critical discussion.
