EUROPE FROM ONE WORLD WAR TO ANOTHER 1919-45

COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this era European states went from hope that the League of Nations would transform international relations to disillusionment and then into a second world war. The response to the 'Gathering Storm' in the years prior to World War II varied from state to state, as did their responses to the war itself. In this tumultuous era, relations between European states varied, depending on the interests of the particular state, its leadership and events on the international stage. By examining this era we can gain greater insight into the vitally important issues of peace and war, not only for this era but for our own times as well.

Both the mid-term and the final exam will be essay exams. We will discuss the specifics of each exam in class. The mid-term exam will be written in class time. The final exam is a take-home exam. There is no Registrar scheduled final exam for this course.

NO EXTENSIONS WILL BE GRANTED FOR THE TAKE-HOME FINAL EXAM. LATE TAKE-HOME FINAL EXAMS WILL RECEIVE A GRADE OF 'F'.

PLEASE NOTE: NO DISCS OR E-MAILED ESSAYS WILL BE ACCEPTED WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR THE TAKE-HOME FINAL EXAM.

THE RESEARCH ESSAY

Each student must also complete one essay on an aspect of Europe and international relations between 1919 and 1945. The precise topic is up to you but MUST BE CLEARED with the instructor BY 11 MARCH 2013. A penalty of one letter level will be levied for each day late, i.e. an essay which would have received a B+ will be reduced to a B if it is submitted a day late, to a B- if it is two days late, etc. Your essay should be between 12-18 pages (approximately 3000-4000 words). Any essay over 22 pages will be penalised.

Your essay must be TYPED (the font MUST BE at least as large as this font), DOUBLE SPACED and have MARGINS OF AT LEAST 1 INCH ON EACH SIDE, 1 INCH AT THE TOP AND 1.5 INCHES AT THE BOTTOM OF EACH PAGE. You must also NUMBER your pages. DO NOT attempt to circumvent the page limit by single or 1.5 line spacing or by reducing the margins. You must also provide a TITLE PAGE which should include your name, the course name, the instructor's name and the date the essay is submitted.

LATE ESSAYS will be PENALISED by being reduced one grade for each day late. By way of illustration an essay that would have received a B+ if it had been handed in on time, will receive a B if it is handed in one day late, a B- if it is handed in two days late and so on Extensions may be granted upon written request the discretion of the instructor but ONLY IN THE MOST DESPERATE CIRCUMSTANCES and the request must be supported by documentation, eg a physician's certificate or similar official document. No essay will be accepted for marking after 1 April 2013 unless a formal extension has already been granted by the instructor.

PLEASE NOTE: NO DISCS OR E-MAILED ESSAYS WILL BE ACCEPTED WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR THE RESEARCH ESSAY.

Students will not be required a complete all 3 components of the course (midterm exam, research essay, take-home final exam) in order to receive a grade for the course. However, the student will not receive a mark for any components of the course which they do not complete and the resulting zero will be part of the

calculation of the final grade for any student not completing all 3 components of the course. As this is a university course, attendance will not be taken in class.
